

Definition of Terms in Judging

Bloom	An individual flower, one on a stem
House	An individual plant, well cultured, groomed and centered in a clean, well-proportioned pot, not greenhouse grown.
Lateral	Side branch bearing flower cluster.
Scape	One (1) stalk
Specimen	A single plant, bloom, spike, etc.
Spike	A flower structure with stem-less flowers or common lengthened stalk. Also used describing flowers such a as Gladiola, Snapdragon, in which the individual blossom stems are very short.
Spray	A collective mass of small branches with foliage, flowers, or fruit that may be attached, especially when horizontal.
Stabile	Stationary sculptural forms, mobile-shaped, but does not move.
Stalk	A stiff stem, branched or un-branched, with one or more blooms or buds.
Stem	Main ascending part of a plant, no side branches permitted.
Truss	A flower cluster growing out of the tip of a stem.

Some attached foliage is required except where designated by an asterisk. Name variety, if possible. Preference is given to named varieties. During judging Chairperson may sub-divide specimens as needed.

Painted, treated, dried plant material is allowed in any artistic entry. Fresh plant material must **also** be evident in every entry, except where specified. Accessories may be used at the discretion of the arranger. Unless the style of design is noted, the arranger may choose his/her own interpretation. Miniature arrangements are not to exceed 5 inches in any direction. Exhibitors must be responsible for their awards each year to merit advancement. **Flags are not permitted in arrangements.**

Novice— Open to beginners and exhibitors who have never won a trophy, or winners who have not won three First Prizes in previous years, and to those who have never exhibited.

- 1. "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre" (1948)an arrangement that includes cactus or cacti.
- 2. "Sunset Blvd." (1950)...... featuring reds, yellows, and orange colors
- 3. "Rosemary's Baby" (1968)Artistic arrangement featuring herbs

Amateur— Open to all not qualifying in Advanced or Novice. Amateur exhibitors enter the Advanced Amateur Class by winning three First Prizes in one or more Duluth Garden Flower Society Shows.

- 4. "The Wild Bunch" (1969)an arrangement of wildflowers
- 5. "The Green Mile" (1999)arrangement using non-flowering plants
- 6. "Rain Man" (1988)featuring flowering plant(s) that are commonly used in a rain garden
- 7. "Black Swan" (2010)using plants that have black flowers or foliage

Rebecca Boyington Advanced Amateur— Open to all exhibitors who are advanced from the Amateur Class.

- 8. "American Beauty" (1999)a display with roses
- 9. "Gone with the Wind" (1939)highlighting tall grasses
- 10. "The Wizard of Oz" (1939)...... featuring Yellows in a linear form

Open Class— Open to all exhibitors.

- 11. "Lincoln" (2012)an arrangement of conflicting blues and grays
- 12. "Citizen Kane" (1941)featuring rosebuds or miniature roses
- 13. "Wild Strawberries" (1957)artistic arrangement of edible plant(s)
- 14. "The Deer Hunter" (1978)..... a display including a deer antler or deer skull

Special Exhibit (Photography)

Open to all exhibitors.

Photography Display

1. Garden Scene

A. A photograph of a garden scene, with the garden and flower constituting 50%, or more, of the photograph. The layout may be either portrait or landscape oriented.

2. Portrait of Flowers

A. A photograph of a single flower or spray of flowers. The flower(s) may be in a vase, pot, or in the ground, and the container may or may not be visible in the photograph.

3. Flower Arrangement

A. A photograph of a flower arrangement

All photographs must have been taken by the exhibitor. The flowers and arrangements do not have to be grown or arranged by the photographer. Each entry shall be an unmatted 5" X 7" photograph. On the registration tag, identify the plant species and variety, arranger's name, and location of the where the photograph was taken, if known. This exhibit is open only to photographs that have not won any awards in any photography competition.
